

Cross-country exchange and learning on Violence Against Women (VAW) Prevention and the RESPECT framework

23-26 October 2023 Seoul, the Republic of Korea (President Hotel)

Introduction

UN Women and partner UN agencies have developed a range of evidence-based policy guidance on ending violence against women (VAW) with a specific focus on VAW prevention including: <u>A Framework to Underpin Action to Prevent Violence against Women</u> (2015) and <u>RESPECT Women: Preventing Violence against Women</u> (2019). In order to move from policy to practice, UN Women and WHO have developed a package of implementation materials for the RESPECT Framework intended to support governments, civil society organisations (CSOs) and UN agencies. The materials include guidance, promising practices and links to resources and tools for the design, implementation, monitoring and evaluation of comprehensive and evidence-based interventions to prevent VAW. The <u>RESPECT Implementation Package</u> includes:

- The RESPECT Framework
- Overview: How to use the Implementation Package / online resources
- Strategy Summaries: Individual briefs on how to implement each of the R-E-S-P-E-C-T strategies including key approaches and interventions, design and implementation tips
- Programme Summaries: Detailed information on the nuts and bolts of specific programmes that have been shown to have a promising impact on VAW prevention.
- Enabling Environment Mini-briefs: Examples and resources on how to work to improve the enabling environment for VAW prevention
- Monitoring and Evaluation (M&E) Guide: A summary of key guidance on strategies for monitoring and evaluating programming on the prevention of VAW
- National VAW Prevention Strategy Workbook: A workbook to support policy makers to develop national strategies focused on preventing VAW

To support understanding and promote the cross-country learning in Asia and the Pacific region, and to expand knowledge and skills on Violence Against Women (VAW) prevention, <u>UN Women Centre of Excellence for Gender Equality based in Seoul, the Republic of Korea</u> and <u>UN Women Regional Office for Asia and the Pacific</u> are hosting a cross-country exchange and learning on Violence Against Women (VAW) Prevention and the RESPECT framework with an aim to strengthen the capacity of the key stakeholders on RESPECT Implementation package and provide an opportunity for learning and exchange on EVAW within the region.

Objectives

- To understand the core elements of successful VAW prevention programmes
- To reflect on participants' experiences implementing programmes to prevent VAW
- To review key VAW prevention strategies and approaches outlined in the RESPECT Framework and implementation guidance.
- To refresh or become familiar with and use the RESPECT Framework implementation guidance.
- To identify and map the existing interventions following RESPECT Framework
- To analyse promising programme examples from selected countries in the region and look at how they can be adapted and implemented effectively in different contexts.

Participants: The workshop will include an estimated 48 participants from Australia, Bangladesh, Cambodia, China, Fiji, India, Indonesia, the Republic of Korea, Timor-Leste and Viet Nam. The participants are nominated by UN Women Country Offices with the below criteria:

- Representatives from the government agencies and CSO who are UN Women partners on preventing VAW.
- Experts who work closely with UN Women country offices as the resource persons on EVAW and EVAW prevention for the implementation of the EVAW programmes
- UN Women technical staff on EVAW

Facilitators and roles: The workshop series will be co-facilitated by UN Women and independent experts.

Training venue and logistics: The workshop will be conducted in three days from 23 to 25 October 2023 at President Hotel, 16 Eulji-ro, Jung-gu, Seoul, the Republic of Korea. The workshop will start each day at 9.00 am and end at 5.00 pm. On 26th October, there will be technical discussions between UN Women and countries that have projects/programmes on EVAW and VAW prevention where UN Women has its presences to discuss about the current programme on preventions of VAW. The workshop will be facilitated in English and all workshop materials will be available to participants in English. Simultaneous interpretation will be provided for Korean participants.

Preparation: Acknowledging that participants may have different levels of knowledge and experience of VAW prevention work, we also include in the Annex suggestions for further reading. Before the workshop commences, based on an outline proposed by UN Women, participants will be asked to prepare their presentations on their organization's experience and lessons learned on VAW prevention and response programming. Participants are also asked to bring with them any relevant data and materials that they can obtain on the prevalence, causes and consequences of different types of VAW in their country and examples of promising policies and programmes to prevent VAW.

Feedback: Before and at the end of the workshop, participants will be asked to complete the online self-assessment survey which also includes workshop feedback.

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RESPECT Women: Preventing violence against women – Resource hub (WHO, UN Women, UNFPA, UNDP)

The RESPECT Women website, an online one-stop platform, outlines a set of action-oriented steps to support policy makers and programme implementers to design, plan, implement, monitor and evaluate programmes using seven strategies to prevent violence against women. RESPECT is an evidence-based framework for policy makers to strengthen and scale up efforts to prevent violence against women, building on an increasing body of evidence on what works to prevent violence against women.



Practice brief: Doing violence prevention well – Matching aspirations with funding timeframes (UN Women & Prevention Collaborative)

This practice brief provides ideas and examples of prevention programming that would be suitable for different timeframes, ranging from 1 year, 2 years, 3 years to 5 years and above. It also highlights investments that for ethical and effectiveness reasons should be avoided. The brief's goal is to provide benchmarks for reasonable investment that programme officers can use when writing concept notes or negotiating funding. It supports practitioners working to address VAW manage expectations and negotiate realistic objectives and timeframes in order to avoid organisations' investment and women's safety at risk.
