Background

Known to be underestimated, the prevalence of violence against women (VAW) is alarmingly high in Asia and the Pacific. More than one in four women aged 15-49 in the region had experienced physical and/or sexual intimate partner violence at least once in their lifetime. One in ten women experienced this in the last 12 months.¹

Violence against women is rooted in gender-based discrimination, social norms that accept violence, and gender stereotypes that continue cycles of violence. To date, efforts to eliminate violence against women have mainly focused on responding to and providing services for survivors of violence. However, prevention is pivotal to eliminating violence against women and girls completely. Preventing violence against women requires a multifaceted approach that addresses the root causes and drivers of violence, challenging existing power structures that allow for systemic inequalities, and empowers individuals and communities.

In line with the theme of this APFSD, which focuses on advancing sustainable, inclusive, science- and evidence-based solutions for the 2030 Agenda and aligning with this year's APFSD's emphasis on SDG 5 among others, this side event will examine evidence-based solutions and promising practices for preventing violence against women in the Asia-Pacific.

Key Questions and Outcomes

This side event will examine the following key guiding questions:

- 1. What are the key ingredients of prevention programs that bring about a sustainable shift in harmful social norms?
- 2. What are some examples of impactful, evidence-based practices for VAW prevention in the Asia-Pacific region?
- 3. How can national policies and frameworks in the Asia-Pacific better integrate and evaluate VAW prevention efforts?

Bringing together a diverse panel of discussants, this side event aims to spotlight evidence-based solutions and promising practices for preventing violence against women in the Asia-Pacific, with a focus on sustainable, inclusive, and data-driven approaches. In doing so, it will help to clarify how national strategies, evidence-based approaches, and cross-sectoral collaboration can create a comprehensive approach to VAW prevention. Evidence is emerging about what works to prevent violence from occurring in the first instance, and examples are growing within this region and beyond. The side event will unpack why and how to work with men, boys, women and girls, and specific populations to prevent VAW. By the conclusion of the session, participants are expected to advance an evidence-based understanding of VAW prevention and of how to integrate VAW prevention into sustainable development.
